After a brilliant tango lesson we went to Marabú, a non-touristy dance club in Buenos Aires's San Telmo district




Mostly people just danced, but at one point these profesional dancers put on a show. I loved their outfits.


La casa mínima: the narrowest house in Buenos Aires (San Telmo área)


Our main excursión was to the spectacular waterfalls of Iguazú




Iguazú is located where Argentina (near) meets Paraguay (left), and Brazil (right).
